


# **New Acquisitions for the Historical Collection**

A nother active year of collecting added nearly 500 individual items to the historical collection. The objects were acquired both through donation and purchase, some of the latter supported by the Jahn Collections Development Fund. The pieces include a vast array of object types.

Numerous original historic photographs, dating from the 1880s to the 1970s, were donated and purchased. This included a previously unknown stereoview card and several commercial cabinet cards. We have been actively collecting these since the 1960s and yet continue to find unique examples of these popular photo souvenirs of the Victorian era. Two significant donations of family photo albums were also made. The first were from a descendent of a crew member from the Mackinac Island Coast Guard Station, now the park visitor's center. The views show the men at work and play on the island and the only known images of the station's interior. The second donation of albums were from descendants of the Milton Tootle family of the East Bluff. Among the photos are views of the famed Japanese Garden on the cottage grounds and images of family and friends swimming at the Cudahy family pool on the West Bluff and golfing at Wawashkamo. A number of glass-plate negatives were also part of the gift. Thirteen excellent mid-twentieth century press photographs were also added to the collection as well as twenty previously unknown postcards.

Significant additions to the art collection included a watercolor by Stanley Bielecky, featured in the summer issue, and two miniature engravings of the construction of the Mackinac Bridge by Reynold Weidenaar. Very rare, these

two works were part of a series of five bridge views by the noted Grand Rapids artist. Over the last eight years we have acquired examples of the three larger, better-known works, and this acquisition completes our collection. The Bielecky watercolor went on exhibit at the Manoogian Art Museum this past summer and the Weidenaar works will join them next season. The Weidenaar acquisition was acquired through the Jahn Fund.

A wide variety of other objects demonstrate the breadth and depth of our collections scope. Of note are a number of pieces added to the souvenir-ware collection including four Kriesche engraved pressed-glass items as well as a number of late-Victorian, German-produced pictorial porcelain pieces. Other interesting acquisitions included an 1891 New Mackinac hotel register; a SS North American ship's newsletter; and shipwreck artifacts from the 1871 Colonel Ellsworth. Several historic objects were also purchased to enhance existing period settings at Fort Mackinac.

All the objects acquired this year enhance the richness of the museum and archival collections. Whether rare or common, whimsical or inspiring, each adds another piece to our mosaic of Mackinac history, helping form a more complete picture that allows us to better understand and appreciate our past.

Mackinac State Historic Parks will be celebrating 10 years of juried exhibitions at The Richard and Jane Manoogian Mackinac Art Museum in 2019 with the theme "Visions of Mackinac."

Mackinac State Historic Parks encourages

Mackinac State Historic Parks, with Mackinac Associates, is seeking support for a very special addition to Mackinac Island - the Mackinac Island Native American Museum to be developed at the Biddle House on Market Street.

Mackinac Island has been a sacred and historically significant place for Anishinaabek people (Odawa, Ojibway, and Potawatomi) for centuries. Oral tradition, supported by archaeological evidence, speaks of Native settlement dating back to 1000 A.D. From this point forward, Mackinac Island occupied a central place in the Anishinaabek world.

"Few areas in the Great Lakes have the historic relevance that Mackinac Island holds, especially for the indigenous people of our state, the Anishinaabek," said Eric Hemenway, Director, Repatriation, Archives and Records of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and project consultant. "Stories of creation, war, trade, government, as well as everyday life all relate to the Anishnaabek on this special island. These stories have helped to shape what is Michigan today."

The exhibition "Agatha's Mackinac" tells the



Anishinaabek story of Mackinac Island from pre-contact to today through the experiences and relationships of Agatha Biddle (1791-1873), an Odawa woman whose life provides a lens through which to understand and appreciate this rich story.

In recognition of Agatha Biddle's importance to the Anishinaabek people and the region, she was recently inducted into the Michigan Women's Hall of Fame.

Subjects may be people, places, gardens, buildings, landscapes, water views, or whatever subject best captures the artist's creative vision of Mackinac Island.

Entries are currently being accepted and will be accepted through March 8, 2019. Artists will be notified by the juror by March 29 with results, and the "Visions of Mackinac" exhibition will open to the public on May 2, 2019.

An awards ceremony announcing the exhibition winners will take place on June 19.

"We are excited to commemorate 10 years of The Richard and Jane Manoogian Mackinac Art Museum and we look forward to celebrating the beauty of Mackinac Island with this exhibition," said Phil Porter, Mackinac State Historic Parks director.

# **EDUCATION OUTREACH**

Mackinac State Historic Parks closed for the 2018 season in early October. However, that doesn't mean MSHP has stopped interpreting its history to the youth of Michigan.

Each year, historic interpreters from MSHP visit hundreds of students throughout Michigan with its Education Outreach program, thanks in large part to Mackinac Associates. 2019 marks the 31<sup>st</sup> year of *Historic Mackinac on Tour*, an overview of Michigan history through the lens of Mackinac, and the 26<sup>th</sup> year of *Water, Woods and Wildlife*, a natural history program led by MSHP Curator of Natural History Jeff Dykehouse.

Mackinac Associates devotes more than \$30,000 to provide low cost programs, financial assistance, and, in some cases, free programs. Mackinac Associates also provides scholarships up to \$500 to assist schools making field trips to MSHP sites. Further, Mackinac Associates has created an Education Endowment Fund, with a current balance of \$290,000, to ensure that Michigan students will be able to enjoy these programs for years to come.

About 8,000 students receive an outreach program each year. Interpreters traverse Michigan—from the western U.P. all the way down to the Detroit area.

"Students experience the Great Lakes watershed, the fur trade, and, one classroom at a time, students learn the cultural and natural history of Michigan that makes our state great," said Steve Brisson, Mackinac State Historic Parks deputy director.

The 2018–19 outreach season kicked off in November with the *Water, Woods and Wildlife* programs. *Historic Mackinac on Tour* will begin in early 2019. The in-class visits are designed to complement an on-site visit to an MSHP historic site.

# **BE AN ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE**

Mackinac Island has long been an inspiration for artists. Mackinac State Historic Parks is providing an opportunity to continue this tradition.

The Mackinac State Historic Parks Artist-In-Residence Program is designed to promote and encourage the creation of artistic works inspired by the history, natural wonders, and beauty of Mackinac Island. The residencies are available to writers, composers, sculptors, and visual artists including photographers.

The two- and three-week residencies are available beginning in early June and continuing through early October.

"We are excited to see this project come to fruition in 2019," said Mackinac State Historic Parks Director Phil Porter. "We are looking forward to hosting talented artists and watching them create art inspired by Mackinac."


The resident artist will be housed in the newlyremodeled second floor of the Mackinac Island Visitor's Center, formerly the 1915 Mackinac Island Coast Guard Station. The residence, which overlooks the Straits of Mackinac, includes a studio apartment with one full size bed with bedding and towels provided, private bath and shower, kitchen with stove, sink, and full-size refrigerator, washer and dryer, WIFI, and basic kitchen and cleaning supplies. It's an historic building and the second floor is only accessible by stairway. The residence is provided rent-free to the selected artist.

There is a large adjoining work/gathering space that is available by appointment for the artist when not in use by park. The artist also has access, with previous arrangement, to the work space in the lower level of the Richard and Jane Manoogian Mackinac Art Museum for project work and/or workshops.

The artist is asked to provide two public presentations (workshop, lecture, reading, demonstration, etc.) during the residency and contribute one piece of their work to Mackinac State Historic Parks within 12 months. The artist is responsible for transportation to and from Mackinac Island and should bring all personal equipment, supplies, and food.

A jury of representatives from Mackinac State Historic Parks, the Mackinac Island Arts Council, and the Mackinac Island Community Foundation will select from the pool of applicants. Selections will be made solely on the basis of merit and how their work can advance the program's goal of encouraging the creation of artistic works inspired by the history, natural wonders, and beauty of Mackinac Island.

# DIRECTOR'S OUTLOOK

**S** ince the time of earliest settlement, Mackinac has always experienced a dramatic shift in activity between summer and winter. For centuries Native Americans set up seasonal fishing camps in the Straits of Mackinac, only to retreat to winter hunting grounds with the coming of the autumn winds. Similarly, the fur trade and fishing industries generated significant summer activity followed by long, quiet winters. And now, for more than 150 years, tourism has been the economic engine generating summer activity. Not surprisingly, this seasonal fluctuation very much dictates the flow of life for Mackinac State Historic Parks.

Between early May and late October we host nearly 1,000,000 visitors to our parks and historic sites. As the flow of tourists diminishes at the end of the season we shift our primary focus from providing public programs and services to a season of winter projects. Like most area businesses, the "off season" provides the only opportunity to address new construction, exhibition, and major maintenance issues.

This winter our island park operations staff is completing the renovation of the second floor of the Visitor's Center for the Artist in Residence program, initiating work on the new restroom/shelter facility behind Fort Mackinac, remodeling restrooms and kitchens, clearing trees and brush along roads and hillsides, and tackling a myriad of ongoing maintenance and small construction projects. On the mainland, major projects include continued brick restoration and plastering at Old Mackinac Point Lighthouse, construction of new chimneys and repairing bark roofs at Colonial Michilimackinac, and remodeling housing units.

New exhibits, designed and fabricated by our museum programs staff, include an updated "Water Power Station" at Historic Mill Creek Discovery Park, a dramatic audio-visual display in the North Blockhouse, and new period settings and exhibits in the Post Headquarters at Fort Mackinac. The exhibit space in the north room of the Michilimackinac Soldiers' Barracks is being remodeled into an interactive period setting. This winter we are also beginning to design the interpretive elements that will be included in the new Mackinac Island Native American Museum at the Biddle House.


Winter also provides time for historic research and writing. New publications this year include a book featuring images from the photo album of Lieutenant Edward Pratt who served at Fort Mackinac in the 1880s, and *Memories* of Michilimackinac, the fourth in our series of French translation publications cooperatively published with Michigan State University Press. Reprints include Historic Mill Creek, the Historic Mackinac Island Visitor's Guide, Mackinac National Park, 1875-1895, Were-Wolves and Will-O-The-Wisps, and Movies at Mackinac.
