New Trustees Elected at Annual Meeting

E rin Burns, a life-long resident of Michigan, and Shannon Haan Westblade, a thirdgeneration owner/innkeeper on Mackinac Island, were unanimously voted to the Mackinac Associates Board of Trustees at its annual meeting August 12.

Burns has been a frequent visitor to Mackinac Island since childhood. A graduate of Michigan State University, Burns has held sales and marketing jobs with the Campbell Soup Company and Time Warner, followed by several years with the American Cancer Society, specializing in planned giving. She transitioned to association management after spending time raising her sons, and is currently the Executive Director for the Michigan History Foundation. Erin and her husband Jeb have been members of Mackinac Associates for almost two decades and have passed on their love of history and the straits region to their twin sons, Thomas and Conor (aka "Dock Boy" with the Fort Mackinac Never Sweats "base ball" team). "It's an honor and a privilege to serve on the board of Mackinac Associates. It's a wonderful opportunity to give back to the community that has brought so much joy to my family." Burns said. "I look forward to working with such a talented group to preserve the history of Mackinac." Westblade is the owner/innkeeper of Haan's 1830 Inn on Mackinac Island. Growing up in a historic bed and breakfast on Mackinac Island inspired Shannon's love for history and the natural world and her passion to preserve it. Her degree in history, with a focus on American frontiers, has amplified this passion. Shannon and her husband Lucas have two kids, Gideon and Heidi.

"I am excited to be a part of Mackinac Associates, with the goal of inspiring others to join in the mission of preserving our parks for generations to come," Westblade said.

Burns and Westblade replace Jeb Burns, who was term-limited off, and Natalia Wohletz, who chose not to run for reelection. Jeb Burns served as board president in 2022, among other board leadership roles.

The meeting was held at Wawashkamo Golf Club, which celebrated its 125th anniversary in 2023. The meeting included a presentation from Phil Porter, former Mackinac State Historic Parks Director and current historian at Wawashkamo. Members were also invited to test out hickory stick putters on the putting green. Jeb Burns highlighted the summer events and the generous support of members over the past year. Burns, Wohletz, and Lieder were presented plaques for their service on the board. At the regular Associates board meeting August 25, Harbor Springs resident and St. Ignace native Wendie Keen was appointed to the board, filling the seat of Kathy Lieder, who resigned from the board to focus on family commitments. Keen's love of the Straits of Mackinac began early on. Her first visit to the island was when she was four years old and as a teen she spent summers working on the island. Keen shares her love of Michigan with her husband, Brad, six grown children, their spouses, and eight grandchildren. Wendie and Brad were married on the island and continue the tradition of visiting as often as they can. Professionally, Keen has served in leadership roles in the resort industry at historic Californian resorts: The Claremont, Sonoma

Mission Inn, and Ranch Las Palmas.

Returning to Northern Michigan in 2008, Wendie now applies her talents as vice president of spa and owner services with Boyne Resorts, supporting resorts in Michigan, Maine and Montana. She also has a passion for real estate and has restored numerous historic homes within Northern Michigan.

"Mackinac Island is one of my favorite places in the world," Keen said. "This sacred area with its rich history and natural beauty is so very important, and I am honored to join this board and dedicate time to its preservation and enhancement."

"Erin, Shannon, and Wendie will make excellent additions to the Mackinac Associates board," said Steve Brisson, Mackinac State Historic Parks Director. "All have deep connections to Mackinac Island and the Straits of Mackinac area and bring unique skills and backgrounds to the board.

"We thank Jeb, Natalia, and Kathy for their dedication to the Mackinac Associates board," Brisson continued. "We look forward to their continued involvement with Mackinac Associates in the future."

In addition to appointing Keen, the board elected the following officers at its regular meeting: Todd Callewaert, president; Skip Young, vice president; Brian Bailey, treasurer; and Nancy Porter, secretary. Other members of the Board of Trustees include Nicole Doud, David Levy, Heather Martin, Stephen Murray, Joan Slater, and Sheldon Smith.

Explore Historic Traditions AT A COLONIAL CHRISTMAS

Mackinac State Historic Parks doesn't stop interpreting the history of the Straits of Mackinac just because it's winter! Join us for A Colonial Christmas, taking place at Colonial Michilimackinac on Saturday, December 9, from 3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

A Colonial Christmas will immerse guests into the holiday traditions of Michilimackinac in the 17th and 18th centuries. Visitors will be able to tour the site at their own pace, heading into buildings that will feature interpreters describing various Christmas traditions and try era-appropriate snacks and drinks throughout their visit.

Upon entering the site, lanterns will light a path to the South Southwest Rowhouse, where guests can purchase tickets and receive their first goodies. Dedicated photo spots will also

dot the entry into the fort, allowing for that perfect winter photo opportunity.

Once inside the fort, guests can head to the Southwest Rowhouse, where they'll learn about French-Canadian traditions; the Guardhouse, where British civilian and military traditions will be discussed; the Barracks, where German military traditions will be presented; the Northwest Rowhouse, where crafts will be available, allowing guests to take home a piece of their visit; Northwest Rowhouse Unit A, where they'll learn about French New Year's celebrations, including a chance to cut into the King's cake to find a prize; the Priest's House, where wassail will be distributed; and Ste. Anne's Church, where the church will be set up for holiday mass. Finally, out on the parade ground, a fire will be set up and stories of the first Christmas at Mackinac (1675) will be told, and games like trap ball will be available for guests to play.

This event is free for Mackinac Associates, excluding the Heritage-level season pass.

DIRECTOR'S OUTLOOK:

A s reported last fall, we were fortunate to receive a special \$35-million appropriation for infrastructure improvements throughout our parks. Over the course of the last year, we have been focused on initiating the first round of these projects. We have spent many hours with architects, engineers, and our colleagues at the Department of Technology, Management & Budget. The design phase has wrapped on the first of these, and I'm pleased to report that earth is turning.

The new Milliken Nature Center at Arch Rock broke ground in early September, and the project is making steady progress. It is scheduled to open in early May of next year. The building will provide much needed upgrades to the restrooms at the most visited natural feature in the park. The nature center portion of the building will allow our guests to delve into the geology of Mackinac Island. The exhibit is funded through Mackinac Associates.

On October 30 we broke ground on an addition to the Southwest Rowhouse at Colonial Michilimackinac. The site of the 1770s building was excavated from 1960 through 1963. This is our first eighteenth-century reconstruction at the site in ten years. It will initially contain an exhibit on slavery at Michilimackinac, also funded by Mackinac Associates.

There are several other additional projects that are shovel ready and scheduled to begin in the spring. Bids for paving of select roads in Mackinac Island State Park have been let and will commence in April or May, depending on the weather. This will include sections of Fort Street, Huron Road, Cemetery Road, and Cupid's Pathway. We also hope to break ground in May on an addition to the Petersen Center in Mackinaw City. This will provide more archaeological storage, expansion of the Widder Library, and badly needed staff support space. On the island we will begin construction of a new Park Field Office and a Waste Management Facility. Both these operations are currently in sub-standard locations. The current field office is housed within the 1870s Noncommissioned Officers' Quarters. It is not accessible, cramped, and not energy efficient. The current waste management operation is housed in a warehouse, poorly designed for the processing of the tons of trash collected in the park each summer. The new facility will increase the efficiency and sanitation of this process. In addition, both current facilities will be repurposed.

Three other projects are in the final design phase and likely to commence next fall. Major renovations will begin on the 1934 Scout Barracks behind Fort Mackinac. This work includes adding fire suppression to the building, new bathrooms, and upgrades to the kitchen. Work on the Fort Mackinac Soldiers' Barracks will provide the first major update to the restroom facility since the late 1960s. The entire interior will also be remodeled for new exhibits and a multi-purpose room/theatre. The Colonial Michilimackinac Visitor's Center was built in 1971. Interior renovations were last made in 1988, but little has been done since then. The new project will include heating and air conditioning and installation of restroom facilities inside the center, rather than in the adjacent parking lot. Many of the projects noted above are overtly

public facing, such as paving, upgrades to the visitor's center, and the new Milliken Nature Center. While the other projects are more behind the scenes, they are still very much in support of our mission to serve the public. They will improve many aspects of our operation, from research and preservation to trash handling. Many more smaller-scale maintenance projects will be underway in the next six months including roofing and painting of numerous historic structures, masonry repairs to the Fort Mackinac walls, and upgrades to HVAC and fire suppression systems. This winter we will also initiate the next round of projects, including upgrades to the visitor's centers on Mackinac Island and Historic Mill Creek. Altogether, these projects will greatly improve the visitor experience and enhance our ability to preserve, protect and present the treasures under our care.

CITY OF CHEBOYGAN FERRY, EARLY 1900'S

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the Michigan State Highway Ferry system that transported automobiles across the Straits of Mackinac from Mackinaw City to St. Ignace. The first vessel that was used was the Ariel which could carry twenty automobiles. As traffic increased, larger vessels were purchased including the Ann Arbor No. 4 which had served as a railroad ferry on Lake Michigan. The ship had a storied past having endured a terrible storm the night of February 14, 1923. The ship lost one of its railroad cars off the stern and ended up hitting the Frankfort, Michigan pier and sinking. It was raised and eventually came to the straits in 1937 where it was renamed the City of Cheboygan. The vessel served the ferry system until the Mackinac Bridge was opened in 1957. The ship was later used to store potatoes on Washington Island, Wisconsin before being scrapped in 1973.
